

## **Key Words**

**CBD** - central business district.

**Commercial** - an area of businesses, shops and offices. **Commuters** - people who travel a distance to get to work

**Function** - the main purpose of a place.

**Industrial** - an area of mainly factories, or work places.

Megacity - a city with over 10 million people.

**Natural advantage** - an aspect of the environment that makes a site good for a settlement.

**Residential**- an area of mainly houses where people live.

**RUF**- rural-urban fringe

Rural- countryside, or natural area.

**Settlement**- a place where a number of people live permanently.

**Site**- a location or specific place.

**Sprawl**- spreading outwards.

Urban- city, or built-up area.
