- Development Process of growth and change for a country, this can be social, economic and environmental
- Indicator A way of measuring the development of a country
- GDP Gross Domestic Product the amount of money a country has
- **HDI** Human Development Index the measure of wealth, health and education of a county.
- Quality of life Access to basic happiness (e.g. family, food, water, shelter, health, learning, etc.)
- Standard of living The amount of money or wealth you have and the things this allows you to buy (e.g. house, electricity, transport)
- Conflict a disagreement
- Middle East –a collection of countries located where the continents of Africa, Europe and Asia meet
- **Taliban** A group of people with the same beliefs who mainly live in Afghanistan
