Language for Learning:

- **Context**: when and where something happens
- Harmony: Chords I, IV and V, the 12 Bar Blues; a chord progression over 12 Bars
- Tonality Blues Scale a group of notes (a scale) used in blues music. Blues notes – 'flattened notes'.
- Musical Features: Riff- a short repeated phrase. Walking bass- a continuous moving bass line
