<p><b>Lesson Overview</b></p> <p>Lesson 1 – Introduction to human rights</p> <p>Lessons 2 and 3 – Prejudice and discrimination</p> <p>Lesson 4 – Racism</p> <p>Lesson 5 – Freedom of religious expression</p> <p>Lesson 6 – Social Justice</p> <p>Lesson 7 – Introduction to wealth and poverty</p> <p>Lesson 8– Exploitation of the poor</p> <p>Lesson 9 - Religious views on wealth and poverty</p> <p>Lesson 10- Revision</p> <p>Lesson 11 – Assessment</p> <p>Lesson 12 - DIT</p>	<p><b>Key words</b></p> <p><b>Charity</b> -Voluntarily giving time or money to help people in need.</p> <p><b>Discrimination</b> -Actions that come from prejudice attitudes.</p> <p><b>Equality</b>-Belief that everyone is equal in value and worth.</p> <p><b>Exploitation</b>-Treating and paying people unfairly.</p> <p><b>Fair pay</b>- Payment that is appropriate for the work done.</p> <p><b>Freedom of religious expression</b>-The right to freely practice religion without discrimination or punishment.</p> <p><b>Homosexuality</b> - Being physically/sexually attracted to persons of the same gender.</p> <p><b>Human rights</b>-The rights a person should be entitled to simply because they are a human being, eg education, fair treatment etc.</p> <p><b>Interest</b> -Money paid back on loans in addition to the original amount borrowed.</p> <p><b>Justice</b>-Fairness; working to fix an unfair situation.</p> <p><b>Loan</b>-Amount of money borrowed from a lender, usually paid back in installments with interest.</p> <p><b>People trafficking</b>-Illegal transport of people from one country or area to another, often resulting in forced labour or sexual exploitation.</p> <p><b>Positive discrimination/action</b>-Positive discrimination is favouring a person or group to try and rectify negative treatment in the past</p> <p><b>Poverty</b>-The state of being without the things needed for a reasonable quality of life, so that day-to-day living is a struggle.</p> <p><b>Prejudice</b>-Negative thoughts, feelings or beliefs about a person (prejudging them) based on a characteristic they have, e.g. their sexuality or ethnicity</p>
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
