Times when religious programmes are shown on TV</p> <p>Forms of Media - Television, Radio, Newspaper, Internet, Soaps, Books</p> <p>Freedom of Speech - The concept of being allowed to say what you want, no matter how distasteful, without threat of punishment or imprisonment</p> <p>Magazine Programmes - Programmes which show a mixture of news, reviews and interviews with people in religious news, they are more likely to be on the radio, but TV programmes sometimes have magazine sections</p> <p>Media - A form of communication</p> <p>Moral Issues - Something which is regarded as the right thing to do by some people, and as the wrong thing by other people. E.g. Racism, divorce, abortion, euthanasia, cohabitation...</p> <p>Portrayal of Christians in the media -How Christians are presented in the media. How they come across. E.g.—Dot Cotton/ Ned Flanders.</p> <p>Religious Broadcasts - Everyman Programme, Songs of Praise, Witness, Heart and Soul, Religious documentaries and Magazine programmes</p> <p>Soap Opera - A television or radio drama series dealing typically with daily events in the lives of the same group of characters</p> <p>Pornography - the explicit description or showing of sexual activity</p> <p>Evangelism - ‘Evangelise’ literally means ‘to spread the good news’. Christianity is a proselytising religion i.e. it goes out to make converts.</p>
